PROMOTING PRIDE ON THE SOUTH SIDE

Making Community Connections By Lori Fisher

It was the end of a busy Tuesday at Buckeye Middle School. When I arrived at the school office, it was still buzzing. Various groups of people were wrapping up their duties. My attention was drawn to a young girl who entered with her teacher. She was visibly upset and the adult with her was trying to ease her concerns. It was another reminder of just how much patience and caring are needed to nurture and guide our children. Buckeye Middle School does more than just educate our kids. The school has a history of making connections in the community.



Buckeye is a resource for parents and area residents seeking employment and other opportunities. They recently partnered with the U.S. Census Bureau to connect residents to good paying jobs starting at \$20 per hour. Each week in March, the Census Bureau is conducting employment application workshops to help guide residents through the process of applying for work with the Census.

"The workshops have been successful. One of our parents was hired from the connection and a few other residents are in the hiring pipeline," shares Janet Love, Assistant Principal.

The U.S. Census Bureau began actively hiring last year, but a variety of fulltime and part-time positions are still available in Columbus:

Recruiting Assistant

Assists in recruiting and testing job applicants.

• Census Field Supervisor

Appoints, trains, and supervises Enumerators that are engaged in data collection.

Office Operations Supervisor

Coordinates, supervises, and oversees the work of office clerks in specific functional areas.

Enumerator

Locally hired workers who perform field enumeration activities in and around their respective neighborhoods.

Clerk

Office clerks perform a wide variety of clerical functions in support of field data collection, recruiting, payroll/personnel, automation technology, and quality assurance operations.

2020 Census—Shape Your Community



Your privacy matters.

By law, the Census Bureau cannot release any identifiable information about you, your home, or your business, even to law enforcement agencies. That's protected under Title 13 of the U.S. Code.

Spread the word

Through your social media channels, your voice can make a difference. Share Census 2020 facts with your neighbors, family, and friends.





Census results affect planning and funding for healthcare—including programs such as Medicaid, Medicare Part B, State Children's Health Insurance, and the prevention and treatment of substance abuse.

Shaping the future

Invitations to respond to the 2020 Census will be delivered between March 12-20. Once you receive that invitation, you can respond online, by phone, or by mail.



It should come as no surprise that inflation decreases the amount of stuff you can buy. A year from now, the same amount of money will probably buy you less house, less car and less of anything else. Boosting your purchasing power will come in handy, particularly when you buy a home or other pricey merchandise you want.

Generate a Second Income

Making more money can increase how much money a lender lets you borrow and lowers the interest rate on the money you borrow.

It's amazing how a few extra dollars can add up over time. Consider freelancing part-time or pursuing a small, home-based business on the side to add to your income. Both good credit and a higher income give you more buying power.

Good credit increases your purchasing power

Unfortunately, a less-than-perfect credit score is going to buy you less of anything you want. Your credit score affects your buying power and is especially important when shopping for a big-ticket item like a home or vehicle. To make up for a lower score, you're probably going to need to use more of your total amount of credit available which

can actually lower your score even more, which is exactly what you don't want to happen. According to myFICO, owing fewer debts and paying all your bills on time are key factors credit reporting agencies use to calculate your score. Another way to boost your score is not to open any new credit accounts that you don't need.

Steps to improve your credit score

Repairing bad credit or building credit for the first time takes patience and discipline. There is no quick way to fix a credit score.

Check your credit report for errors

Carefully review your credit report directly from all three credit reporting agencies for any incorrect information. Dispute inaccurate or missing information by contacting the credit reporting agency and your lender. Remember: checking your own credit report has no impact on your credit score.

Pay bills on time

Making payments on time to your lenders and creditors is one of the biggest contributing factors to your credit score. Delinquent payments, even if only a few days late, and collections can have a negative impact on your credit score. Past problems like missed or late payments are not easily fixed, but the longer you pay your bills on time after being late, the more your credit score should increase. Consider enrolling in automatic payments to have payments automatically debited from your bank account.


If you are having trouble making ends meet, contact your creditors as soon as possible and seek a legitimate credit counselor. The sooner you seek help the faster you can get back on track. Seeking assistance from a credit counseling service will not hurt your credit score.

Reduce the amount of debt you owe

High outstanding debt balances can negatively affect a credit score. You can increase your buying power by keeping balances low on credit cards and other revolving credit. Don't close unused credit cards as a short-term strategy to raise your scores; and don't open several new credit cards you don't need to increase your available credit. This approach

could backfire and actually lower your credit scores. Be aware that paying off a collection account will not remove it from your credit report: it will stay on your report for seven years.



Pay Off Some Debt

Getting rid of short- to medium-term debts gives you more money to spend. After wiping out your credit-card debt, work next on paying off any student loans. Student loans are usually low interest, but the loan terms can extend out over 10 years or more and you might not want the debt hanging over your head for that long.

Think Down Payment

Sometimes it makes better sense not to take all your money to pay off debt. You may actually do better to hold on to some cash, especially if you are looking to buy a house. Saving up for a larger down payment increases your purchasing power, which can help you get more house for your money.

A Starter Home

So many people say, "How could I ever buy a decent house in this town?" Well, start thinking smaller. Instead of a \$300,000 house, you need to find the one that fits your budget today. There will be plenty of time to upgrade that starter home into a bigger dream home later. This is where the term "starter home" came from! Get into a home you can afford now. Begin to pay it down, hopefully build some equity, and then in five or more years, it's possible that you may be able to upgrade.



Consider a Home in Far South Columbus

Buying your first home or renting in a transitional area allows you to get into the market relatively cheaply, and increase your buying power. Many Far South Columbus neighborhoods are transitional areas and as they improve, so will your potential for increased home value. Compared to more popular areas with high home prices and rent, you can increase your buying power while saving money and building equity.

One of the great pet peeves of my life is finding people who refuse to see beyond their current moment. It becomes a challenge to vision plan, imagine



Real Call for Vision

It is time to heal the disenchantment of those who want more. We must cast the prophetic vision before our people perish.

Is on everyone's list for improvements to
the qualify of life on the south side.
Several residents decided it was time for action.
They banded together to form "Operation Southfield" to clean up the streets and bring pride back
to the community.

"Fighting litter is a community effort. Southside Hope is committed to working with the community to make a difference," says Lori Fisher, Director of Southside Hope CDC. "We're asking residents and area businesses to partner with us to keep our community clean."

Neighbors and local businesses are being asked to pick up litter along the perimeter of their own property. Operation Southfield will focus on cleaning up the major intersections and along the major access roads.

Southside Hope CDC is sponsoring the safety vests, gloves, and trash cans for Operation Southfield. The group will work with the City's Keep Columbus Beautiful program for other needed supplies.

The group of volunteers will begin weekly clean ups that target high volume traffic areas in the Marion-Franklin and surrounding neighborhoods in late March.
